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

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

Critically acclaimed singer/ songwriter Shawn McDonald is currently enjoying massive radio success with his electropop single "We Are Brave." It was only fitting that the tour supporting the brand-new studio album, *Brave* (Sparrow Records), adopt that very namesake.

Along with a groove-saturated backing band, the veteran guy with a guitar intermixed tunes off the rhythmically vibrant and lyrically hopeful project with smash singles from his more acoustically minded past ("Take My Hand," "Gravity," "Closer"), which all took on a more soulful/bluesy flavoring in the concert environment.

CHANGING THE WORLD ONE ARENA AT A TIME

PASSION IS NOT AN EVENT. IT'S NOT A CONCERT. PASSION IS SIMPLY DEFINED IN ONE WORD BETTER THAN ANY OTHER WORD, AND THAT'S THE WORD 'JESUS.' – LOUIE GIGLIO

rom its inception in 1997, Passion has striven to represent Jesus to people everywhere. Founded with a mission to awaken the 20 million-plus college students around the world to the reality of a sovereign God, seventeen years later, Passion is one of the largest

conferences in the world, reaching thousands of people around the globe every year. Led by an all-star roster including founder and lead speaker, Louie Giglio, Chris Tomlin, Kristian Stanfill, Christy Knockles, Matt Redman, David Crowder and others, Passion

Redman, David Crowder and others, Passion boasts a caliber of excellence largely unmatched. More than skill, though, it is the heart of the movement that electrifies arenas from the United States to Africa to Europe and everywhere in between. It's that same heart that has played a hand in fighting for basic human rights and freedoms for women and men who are oppressed in far reaches of the world. Each year, as Passion reaches out to college students, it teaches them to also reach out.

As committed to social justice and empowering young people to affect change as they are to the music and speaking that has defined them, Passion enables young people to step up, give back and take a stand against some of the world's greatest injustices from human trafficking to religious persecution. In 2012, \$3.3 million was raised to fight human trafficking. 2013 brought in another \$2.9 million to the cause. In 2014, the 35,000 college students who attended Passion in Atlanta and Houston were challenged to give \$500,000 to send Bibles to Iran. That amount was exceeded by more than \$150,000, totaling \$670,000, which provides 65,000-plus Bibles for the people of Iran.

As radical as it may seem to get that kind of response from college students, it's not at all surprising given the faith of the founders of Passion. These are people who have committed their lives to loving young



people and showing God's love to them. And for every broken college student who walks through the doors at any Passion event, there is a prayer of promise, hope and expectation for him already in place, along with the steadfast belief in the potential of everyone to live in the fullness of Christ.

"Our God can make all things new. We're not holding out vain hope for you—some formula or some system," Giglio says. "We're



talking about the resurrection power of Jesus. Whatever you need isn't bigger than Jesus being raised from the dead."

The strength of that statement is reflective of the guiding Scripture that has shaped the vision of Passion from day one: "Yes, LORD, walking in the way of your laws, we wait for you; your name and renown are the desire of our hearts" (Isaiah 26:8).

That desire resonates through every

Passion album, which captures the annual event live as only they could—powerfully and with the type of expertise that allows listeners to get lost inside the music and the praise wherever they may be hearing it.

Passion: Take It All is the 2014 offering, which tied the 2013 album, Passion: Let the Future Begin, at No. 4 on the overall Billboard chart and No. 1 on the Christian album chart. The single "My Heart is Yours," featuring Kristian Stanfill, is striking all the right notes on radio, as well.

Kristian, one of the newer members of the small Passion team, relatively speaking, has also been changed and impacted by the music and the mission of Passion.

"Chris [Tomlin] is so awesome and funny. It's been so cool to be a pastor with him," says Kristian. "He's such a great friend and mentor. To watch him lead our team like he does with such humility, and to let guys like me come up and stand with him, is so cool. It's the same with Giglio. All the people who are leading are the real deal. Integrity is all over their lives."

Apparently, it's contagious. As Passion continues strong in its mission of walking in the footsteps of the Lord, awakening the world to His presence and enabling others to be the hands and feet of Christ, it's not a stretch to imagine that each person who has a Passion encounter is made better, more alive, more passionate.

Seems like Louie Giglio was right. A concert won't save a soul. No event will stir the innermost workings of a heart. Only one thing does that, and that one thing is what Passion truly is—it's all Jesus.

"We are not obligated to live a life according to the Word of God," concludes Giglio. "But we may, because mercy has come and mercy sends us out."

THE MUSEUM THEIR LINE IN THE SAND

When The Museum burst onto the scene in 2010 with their radio hit, "My Help Comes From the Lord," it was clear they had an anointing. Regardless of music style or lyrical direction, the band was unequivocally leading its audience in worship. This year, they release a new record that is, perhaps, their most vertically and congregationally-oriented to date. Inspired by a season of much-needed time off the road and back in their homes, the album is unapologetically all about worship, aptly titled *What We Stand For*.

CCM caught up with lead singer Ben Richter to learn more about their new direction, how their music is still inspiring them and others to take a stand for social justice and how they managed to work in a banjo and mandolin and come out with an album that's fresh, relevant and all about Him.

CCM: It seems like when you released your debut record, you were on a tear with touring, writing, ministry...How were you able to step back to create such an authentic, focused album this time around?

BEN: We took some time off in 2013. We had such a non-stop 2011 through 2013... we felt like we'd been gone for nearly two years. Now, we're trying to be home with our families more. We definitely feel refreshed and revived, and it's led to a new approach to writing music. Rather than be so rushed and write it on the road, we gave the record the time it needed to really be special. Being

able to take a step back allowed us to be intentional about who we want to be and what we want to say. I've been a worship leader since I was 20. That's a decade now. That's my heart. For this record, we decided that rather than looking at an audience of people, we would look at God as our audience. This is a much more clearly focused worship album. It's been great to draw a line in the sand.

CCM: Your music seems to have also benefited from the strength of your stance. How did you approach this record creatively? **BEN:** We're really excited about the record. It's a little bit wider stylistically. Jason Hoard helped produce the record, and he incorporated bluegrass instruments—a banjo and a mandolin. Overall, we didn't want to take ourselves too seriously. There seems to be a lack of celebration songs in the church; so we intentionally made sure we were writing fun, uplifting, celebratory songs.

CCM: Why did you think it was important to create this album for this time? **BEN:** My pastor was talking about how it's easy for people outside the church to know Christians for the little things they stand against—the things we bicker about and disagree on. We hope that the world can begin to know the church and followers of Jesus for what we stand for—what we believe in. Micah 6:8 states we are to love justice and





mercy and walk humbly with God. It's such a simple and clear commandment. It's what we want to be about and stand for—mercy, love and forgiveness.

CCM: As far as justice is concerned, you guys have always made efforts to partner with various organizations that tackle immense injustice in the world. What have those partnerships looked like? Are you still working within that vein?

BEN: We stand for justice. It's been a big theme of the band for the last three of four years. We were involved in the Not For Sale movement to fight human trafficking as well as with Compassion International. God has called us to look out for the poor and the oppressed. We still have a relationship with Not For Sale. We've been able to partner with Major League Baseball players to help promote awareness for human trafficking. We've always had a huge heart for Compassion. They're working in 26 countries all around the world. We've sponsored a child from the Philippines, which we're still doing. We love to see kids' lives changed.

CCM: You've also mentioned over the years that you strive to remain humble, which isn't always easy for artists who needs to promote their music. What balance have you discovered there? **BEN:** We want to be known as people of humility. It's a funny phenomenon in Christian music. You want to promote your albums and your name; but, ultimately, we hope people see Jesus Christ. We have to keep that in the right order.

CCM: With Christ as your primary purpose and focus, it's easy to see how worship songs would be natural for you to write and share. How do you define worship? **BEN:** Worship is our response to what we value most. Hopefully, that response will be to God for who He is and what He's done. But we don't always truly worship Him. Where you spend your time and money is a good testament of what you value the most. We are following after God, making Him our highest priority and giving Him our best. CCM

here are certain things that only come with time. As life is lived, heartache, victory, joy, loss and peace shape the human heart. At times, the molding and development process is painful. But if it can be approached with even a thimble of faith, God has a tendency to create beauty from the darkest of circumstances.

Rush of Fools has been learning this truth through a season of heartache, grief and growth, all of which inspired their latest album, *Carry Us Now*. New stories, new songs and a new perspective have helped them craft what they say is the album they "were meant to make since the beginning."

Four projects deep, ROF's new-found maturity enables nuances of vulnerability and hope to shine through their latest batch of songs. As artistic, moving and beautiful as they are, however, the songs didn't come without struggle and loss.

"Without a doubt, the past two years have afforded us great blessing and also great hardship," explains Kevin Huguley (keys/guitars). "Most fitting to mention is the fact that we buried two of our parents within the past year. Jamie's mother went to be with Jesus after a lengthy battle with cancer, and Jacob's father passed at the young age of 48."

Wes Willis (lead vocals) adds, "God gave us all a massive peace in the past two years. We clung to our families and church families, and we began writing the record. God is redemptive. We've seen it in our lives, so we wrote about it in this record."

Huguley continues that thought saying, "This new record came at a time that allowed us to write from a perspective of reflection; we were getting to see God's consistency. For us, we feel this record is likely the most telling of who we really are and, arguably, who we've always been. We feel like it's taken us almost a decade to figure that out and flesh it out in our songs."

One listen through the new project indicates that it was worth the wait. Sonically and lyrically, the band (comprised of Willis, Huguley, Jacob Chesnut, Jamie Sharpe and Patrick Sweeney) is confident, creative and intentional. Perhaps some of that is attributed to their third and current label partnership, Sony/Provident Label Group. Of course, revisiting their relationship with producer Jason Ingram also elevated the overall project.

"We're still humbled to get to work with Jason again after all these years," says Huguley. "Since meeting him back in 2006 and making a record together then, we've seen the Lord continue to grow him."



Jason's growth parallels the band's, whose maturation was not without some growing pains. "We are eternally grateful for people who still believe in ROF," says Willis. "It's been emotional wondering if there was a future for us, if we would be able to make another record, even if people would remember who we are. Those are some questions we wrestled with. But God reminded us that it's His church, His ministry, His thing. That's a very sweet spot to be in."

"We feel we are at our healthiest physically, emotionally and spiritually," Huguley adds. "It was fun watching this project go from an unfinished idea to a completed piece."

Willis jumps back in, saying, "We always want listeners to be directed to Jesus. We also really feel like this record is a solid offering of who we are as a band. For a band that's been around as long as we have, we're grateful to be able to say that."

The gratitude is as tangible within the band as it is within their homes. Off the road, they are heavily involved in their local churches (Huguley serves as worship pastor at his home church), which has lent a distinct congregational feel to the music.

"Our new songs are ones that we've been leading and testing with our local churches for many months," says Huguley. "We were reminded by a close friend that songs for the church are eternal. That's huge when you think of it that way.

"Jesus remains the centerpiece of our band's existence, and He is the only hero in our story," he concludes. "It's mind-blowing to recognize that the very hands of Jesus that carried the cross to Calvary are the very hands that carry us now. Through the good and the bad, He sustains. That's what this music is about."

Life will continue to press on. Heartache and loss are inevitable. But so, too, are the sovereignty, grace and compassionate arms of God who always has and always will carry us through.





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ALL SONS & DAUGHTERS CHAPTER NEW

W usic lovers worldwide are captivated, swept up in the surging wave of modern folk as heard from the likes of Mumford and Sons, The Avett Brothers, Neon Trees, The Civil Wars and others. Organic, acoustic and packed with live energy and freedom, it's the unpolished imperfection and open invitation to sing along that has catapulted these artists into the spotlight and up the charts.

For All Sons & Daughters' Leslie Jordan and David Leonard, these qualities are even more keenly experienced in music that connects broken people with their God. Worship leaders at Journey Church in Franklin, Tennessee, their critically acclaimed EPs, Brokenness Aside, Reason To Sing and The Longing, along with their full-length albums, Season One and Live, bear witness to the power of worship by the people, for the people and of the people. In the truest sense, the mesmerizing, soul-baring lyrics and acoustic styling of this talented duo are beginning to make an impact—inside and outside the church.

FRAGMENTS. CHANGE. GROWTH.

Released in May, All Sons & Daughters' selftitled studio album turns the page on a new chapter for the duo, a new season of leaning into their own musical and lyrical instincts.

"We've allowed ourselves to be more creative, more reflective of who we are, while still writing songs for the church," Leslie says of the album. The album's cover art an incredible mixed-media piece created specifically for AS&D by artist Deeann Rieves—perfectly represents the fragmented beauty of growth and decay inherent in all of life.

"We asked Deeann, who is familiar with our work, to listen to the new record and paint a piece that fits what you hear. What you see on the cover is really unique. We feel



like we're standing on the foundation of the fragments and pieces, musically speaking, building on the changes we've encountered over the past few years," David says.

Produced by Paul Mabury, *All Sons & Daughters* features a "wish list" of co-writers. Stu G (of Delirious), Derek Webb, Leeland, Sandra McCracken, Jack Mooring and Francesca Battestelli. "The beauty of cowriting," David explains, "is getting some new blood in to really push us to think differently about the lyrics."

"Your Glory & My Good," co-written with Derek Webb, sets the tone for the album. "It was challenging but so invigorating to write, and it tells such a beautiful story," Leslie says of the song inspired by the story of the woman with a bleeding disorder in Mark 5.

"The older I get, the more I experience life, the more I experience my own depravity, the more I see my need for the kind of bold faith this woman had. She was rejected by society; but she knew if she could just get to Jesus, He could heal her. We don't see that kind of faith much in today's society. That kind of faith is ridiculed. I've been really challenged by that. Even before we started writing, we knew this song would be special."

"You Will Remain" was the first song written for the record. Its melody led Leslie and David to the Gospel of John, where Jesus refers to Himself as "I AM."

"We were struck by the truth of it," Leslie says. "He didn't say 'I was' or 'I will be,' but 'I AM.' And He wasn't overstating anything... the constant, unfailing nature of God and His goodness. We never tire of leading this one."

BY THE MEANS OF GRACE AND THE HOPE OF GLORY /ALL HONOR AND GLORY FOREVER

— "WE GIVE YOU THANKS"

Inspired by a prayer of thanksgiving found in the *Book of Common Prayer*, the benediction that closes out each AS&D event, "We Give You Thanks" emerged with the cowriting help of Jason Ingram.

"It's just such a beautiful moment when we read that prayer as a congregation every night," David explains. "We were sitting around one night and thought, 'What if we wrote a chorus around this thing?' And it's just been such a cool part of the night, connecting that prayer to the chorus and seeing the congregation catch on."


More joyful and celebratory overall, the album includes two songs previously recorded live, songs that are catching on with churches nationwide, now reinterpreted in studio: "Great Are You Lord" and "God With Us," both audience favorites and significant moments on their tours. In these and all the original worship compositions for this eponymous release, Leslie and David continue to pursue authenticity and honesty in the music they make.

With plans to tour with Crowder in October, All Sons & Daughters takes great care to make music that meets people where they are, to find the pulse of the people in the cities where they play, to serve and resource musicians and worship leaders. As always, their song charts are free online, and they continue to take advantage of any opportunity to start new conversations about what worship might look like when approached from an authentic place—worship as a true reflection of the heart...however fragmented, however weak, however strong. EEM

THE HEART OF A CHAMPION BECKAH SHAE REVEALS HERS

iven that Beckah 5 Shae has guested on albums for friends such as TobyMac, Montell Jordan and T-Bone in recent years, it's only fitting that some of them return the favor on her latest. 

CCM: Eight albums in, are you surprised that you're still making music long after most artists have moved on to other careers? BECKAH: It's always been much more than a career for us. Songs and singing for me have been the way that I communicate to God and express what's being poured into my spirit. Singing is what has gotten me through some of the loneliest and toughest times of my life from childhood until now. It is something that I was created and called to do, whether or not it seems successful to others. I do not define my success by the opinions and expectations of people but by the opinions and expectations of God.

What's so fascinating is that as genuinely authentic and relevant as this music is to my life, its relevance reaches right into the lives and hearts of so many others. We will never stop doing what we are doing, simply for the fact that we know this is what God has called us to.

CCM: This makes four albums since 2010, as well as a Christmas album. It seems like you've enjoyed a prolonged fruitful period as an artist. Does it feel that way? BECKAH: I'm always thinking of planting seeds. We can't always wait around for the fruit. Growing takes time. So in the meantime, I continue to plant! It keeps me busy. I have two young daughters I'm building a legacy for. They continually inspire me to make the most of my time. We've got several projects already mapped out for the years ahead! I don't count on seeing the fruit. I just try to stay focused on being grateful and faithful.

CCM: Can you take us into the process of where the songs are coming from these days? BECKAH: Every song, every album I've ever made, has been a clear reflection of the journey I'm on in that season. These days I feel like I am in desperate need of keeping focused on the "Pioneer" and "Champion" of my faith more than ever. When I look around I see a majority clinging to conformity. It is very difficult these days to stand up, stand out and stand firm. Most of these songs are about keeping an eternal perspective, braving the unknown and finishing strong. □□M



SEVENTH DAY SLUMBER BROKEN AND BOLD BY ANDY ARGYRAKIS

For its tenth studio recording in what's quickly creeping up on twenty years, Seventh Day Slumber inked a new record deal with VSR Music Group/ Capitol Christian Distribution and shook up its hit-making formula. Though the group's commitment to ministry is overt as ever throughout *We Are The Broken*, the music is noticeably more aggressive than it's been in the recent past, perhaps most akin to

the band's earliest days. Find out what prompted this return-to-roots dynamic and how the Dove Awardwinning, multiple *Billboard* chart-topping, nearly half-a-million-album-selling act stays so humble from a conversation between front man Joseph Rojas, guitarist Jeremy Holderfield and *CCM*.

CCM: To what extent does We Are The Broken sound like your past work and what

elements are different this time around? JEREMY HOLDERFIELD:

For this record, we've returned to our rock roots. When I sit down and write music, mostly it comes out in big, heavy riffs. Over the last couple of albums though, we were pushed to write certain types of songs and told that it had to sound a certain way. This album had no strings attached [with] no one telling us what it had to sound like.



When you hear it, you'll say, "That's the Seventh Day Slumber I remember!" There's a realness to this record. It's authentic.

CCM: What's inspired you to remain wholeheartedly committed to ministry, even though your sales and success could've easily warranted an opportunity to cross over?

JEREMY: Ministry is why we exist as a band. We have

plenty of accolades for our music and lots of memories from playing concerts all over the world. The truth is, success and the feeling you get while rocking out on stage isn't enough to fulfill you. It will never be enough! There's a higher calling. God has given us an opportunity to bring hope to hurting people. We get the chance to help someone give his life to Jesus. We get to be a part of families being reunited after coming back to Christ at our concert. We get to share in people being delivered from addictions because they heard from God at our concert. Bringing hope to the hopeless is fulfilling. Getting to do that while playing music is an honor.

CCM: In the past, the group's message has revolved around deliverance from drugs and other personal demons. How much of that theme continues these days? **JOSEPH ROJAS:** We Are The Broken is a record about people who have been considered broken and empty—people who have been discarded or didn't fit the mold and people who have been hurt and felt like they had no hope. It's about people who have been doubted and have doubted themselves. We go from that definition to those very same people surrendering their lives to Jesus. The same people crying out for Him to break them and put them back together in any way He sees fit. Being broken for Christ means free-falling into His arms and completely trusting Him! □□M

PRAYING THE PROMISES AN EXCERPT FROM *PRAYING CIRCLES AROUND THE LIVES OF YOUR CHILDREN*

If you are feeling overwhelmed or you don't know where to begin, pray the promises of God. It's almost like downloading updates to your operating system. You are simultaneously upgrading your conscience so it is fine-tuned to the Holy Spirit and Holy Scripture. And that's what enables you as a parent to let go and let God—when you are confident that your children will let their conscience be their guide.

Our most powerful prayers are hyperlinked to the promises of God. When we know we are praying the promises of God, we can pray with holy confidence. We don't have to secondguess ourselves, because we know that God's Word does not return void (Isaiah 55:11). This doesn't mean we can claim the promises of God out of context or claim them for someone else. But our problem as believers isn't over-claiming the promises of God; it's under-claiming them. But if we stand on God's Word, God will stand by His Word.

I've prayed Luke 2:52 thousands of times for my children. And while I don't always notice the tangible evidence of God answering those prayers, I know that what goes around in prayer comes around. So I'm not surprised by the favor my kids have found at critical junctures in their lives. That's their destiny! They have to choose the straight-and-narrow path, but God is preparing good works in advance for them. My son, Parker, recently co-led a mission trip to South Africa. During the trip, one of the team members sent me a short e-mail commenting on Parker's prophetic anointing: "Just wanted to let you know that some of your Luke 2:52 prayers are coming to fruition with Parker. Awesome being on this mission trip with him. Love that guy!"

As my children mature into adulthood, I fully expect them to experience ridiculous favor for which there is no earthly explanation. I've asked thousands of times; I expect thousands of answers!





BAD CHRISTIAN, GREAT SAVIOR

Emery fans are already clued in, and the rest of us are likely to catch up soon on the

band's exciting activities. *BadChristian* is the name of the new website and record label from Matt Carter, Toby Morrell and Joey Svendsen. Now their creative ventures include a new book, *Bad Christian, Great Savior*.

Don't be put off by the name. The book, like the rest of the trio's ventures, is inviting, vulnerable and meaningful for anyone who longs for more than the routine of religion. In fact, as Svendsen explains, the hope is that the book might become a resource for the church to encourage real community and life change.

CCM: Do you remember when you first wanted to become this vulnerable on a large-scale level—to just open up about your story and life and do away with industry concerns of image and so on?

Joey: I'm not sure if it's safe to say that we "always want to be vulnerable on a large-scale." It's often scary, humiliating and not "politically correct." We just can't get it out of our heads that this is what we are supposed to do. Second Corinthians 11:30 says, "If I must boast, I will boast of the things that show my weakness." Later in the same letter, Paul says, "For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:10). This is after he asked God to take something away that God specifically sent to keep him from being conceited.

Honestly, as we set out to do *BadChristian*, our vision was continually refined; and these things went on the top of the list: we don't want to be guarded, keep our sins hidden and not be willing to make mistakes on our podcasts and blog posts. Why would we? So we could keep looking good so people will be drawn to us more than our Savior? That doesn't do anyone a bit of good. We may be a little extreme with this, but we are hoping to be used for major change in the church. The "system" needs a major jolting, and we're ready to take one for the team. At least, we hope we're ready.

CCM: Where did the name BadChristian come in?

Joey: We got some marketing advice when our blog was still titled "Un-learning." The fella read through our old blog posts and said, "Seems like a common theme is Jesus is good, Christians aren't so good. Why not call yourselves 'BadChristian'?" Right when he said this we knew that was it. It was kind of one of those "Why didn't we think of that? That's so obvious!" moments.

CCM: A lot of times it seems vulnerability invites other folks to be just as open. Are you hearing similar stories once you begin to share your own?

Joey: Yes, you just wouldn't believe it. The emails pour in, and it seems to be quite freeing for people. People who have accepted Christ only think that they want to hide their sin. Deep down, they do not. That's contrary to what God would have. We have such a great Savior who was made a public, grotesque spectacle of all the sins of the whole world, triumphing over sin once and for all. And we're supposed to cower in the dark, keeping things hidden so we can steal some of Jesus' heroics? No thank you.




